


About The Collection

As the first Director of Design for Herman Miller from 1946 to 1972, George Nelson defined a straightforward set of principles that guided the company then as now:

- 1. What we make is important
- 2. Design is an integral part of the business
- 3. The product must be honest
- 4. We decide what we make
- 5. There is a market for good design

Putting the philosophy into action, and first articulated in his introduction to the 1948 Herman Miller Collection catalogue. It draws on Nelson's vision by offering a carefully chosen selection of products to furnish environments in a myriad of settings, both elegant and casual.

Seen together, in every type of environment, you realise they speak the same language, and that they are built from the same set of timeless design principles that have guided Herman Miller from the start.








ColourForm Sofa Group






Chadwick Modular Seating






Crosshatch Lounge Chair & Ottoman

the frame in either an ash or walnut in a range of textiles.








Goetz Sofa






Rolled Arm Sofa Group

in walnut or ash.












Scissor Chair






Setu Lounge Chair & Ottoman






Sled Chair






Striad Lounge Chair & Ottoman






Tuxedo Lounge Seating






Wireframe Sofa Group

Visually speaking of softness and volume contained within a formal frame, the Wireframe Sofa Group exemplifies a recurring theme for designers Sam Hecht and Kim Colin: contrasting tension. The design's external structure is shaped from steel wire. Held within the frame are contoured cushions, which find added comfort from a suspension technology first developed by Herman Miller for the healthcare industry.



leather upholsteries and base finishes.








Crosshatch Side Chair







Envelope Chair






Full Twist Guest Chair






Landmark Chair






Leeway Chair






Nessel Chair




AGL Table Group

Many size and material options make it suitable for use as a dining table or a conference table, or any gathering place in need of an elegant surface.














Burdick Table Group






H Frame Table






I Beam Table






Layer Table




Noguchi Rudder Table







Polygon Wire Table




In their expression of pure geometry, Polygon Wire Tables provide an elegant solution to the need for all manner of surfaces, at home, the office, and elsewhere. The structure of the table's wire base yields a dual advantage: a symmetry of form that uses minimal material for maximum strength and a logical method for scaling up or down in size and height to accommodate various dimensions of round, triangle, and hexagon tops of painted Formcoat. By unifying the colour of base and top—in a choice of black, white, or graphite—a single table has a subtle appearance, and a gathering of tables creates an organic composition.
























































Tuxedo Table


Nelson Bubble Lamps - Wall Sconces


